2020 ASSESSMENT MONTH SUMMARY







In December 2011, the Lake Land College Board of Trustees approved a resolution to declare February of each year to be recognized as Assessment Month in an effort to promote the importance of assessment as an educational activity and as a requirement for every employee at the college. Consequently, several promotions were created for students, staff, faculty, and community by the Director of Academic Support & Assessment.


Prior to Assessment Month, promotions were put in place that included: Assessment poster boards and flyers that were strategically placed in all campus buildings; press releases to area newspapers; Facebook messages; and e-mails (see pages 4-6).

The first full week of each February was deemed as "Assessment Week." This event included activities that targeted students. An assessment booth was on display in the Luther Student Center on the main campus and at the Kluthe Center in Effingham. In addition, the Director of Academic Support & Assessment provided educational materials to educate students about what assessment is and the different components of assessment (see page 3). In addition, students were given the opportunity to answer up to five assessment questions (see pages 7-9) for a chance to win Subway and gas gift cards. All students who participated in the drawing were also provided a free phone charger.

General Education Assessment also occurs during the month of February. This year approximately 500 students were assessed for one of the following general education goals: Citizenship, Diversity A, and Diversity B. Twenty-nine faculty participated in the general education assessment effort. Results of the general education assessment will follow in the 2020 Annual Assessment Report.

As the years progress with Assessment Month, Lake Land College seems to be growing awareness of this very important aspect to increase student learning. Because the Higher Learning Commission has placed great importance on the assessment of student academic achievement, this promotional event is crucial in the assessment education for our students, staff, faculty, and community.





<u>Course Assessment:</u> Every course has learning outcomes. Each outcome is measured by faculty through a variety of assignments, tests, projects, evaluations, etc. The goal of course assessment is to revise and improve the student learning experience.

<u>Program Assessment:</u> Every degree, diploma, and certificate program has learning outcomes. Each learning outcome is measured by the faculty in the program through a variety of assignments, tests, projects, and licensing examinations. The goal of program assessment is to revise and improve the curriculum of the program and to insure student success.

<u>General Education Assessment:</u> Measures students' achievements in the areas of communication, critical thinking, problem solving, citizenship, diversity, and foundational knowledge. Any student enrolled in a degree program may be asked to take part in an assessment activity. What does LLC do with general education assessment results? LLC analyzes the results to find areas of weakness and consults with instructors to develop strategies for improvement.

<u>Institutional Assessment:</u> The student learning experience is the responsibility of every department of the college (i.e. Student Services, Business Services, Academic Services, etc.) and is measured by employees through a variety of methods. In other words, how does each department contribute to the student leaning experience?

Lake Land College Celebrates Assessment Month

February is the month to celebrate assessment at Lake Land College. Students and staff members are encouraged to participate in this year's activities to learn about the importance of assessment.

According to Lisa Madlem, director of academic support and assessment for the college, the assessment process at Lake Land is essential in order to make informed decisions that ultimately improve the teaching-learning process.

"Assessment seems fairly straightforward, but in reality, it is an involved process that systematically measures student performance in order to improve the quality of educational programs, courses and the institution overall," said Madlem. Essentially, assessment is what students should know, value, or be able to do upon the completion of a course, program, or interaction with a department.

Lake Land College uses institution-wide measures and program and course-specific measures to assess student outcomes. Learner outcomes have been established for each of the college's associate degree and certificate programs, as well as all courses and departments at the College.

During Assessment Week, February 3-7, Madlem will set up a student booth in the Luther Student Center with assessment information and prizes for students. On February 4th, Madlem will also have a student booth set up at the Kluthe Center in Effingham. Additionally, a student quiz will be available for a chance to win \$10 Subway gift cards and a grand prize \$50 gas gift card!

"Overall, the college is actively assessing courses, programs and institutional departments" said Madlem. "Each component of assessment is working toward assessing the student experience and we are continuously learning from the assessment process in order to make necessary changes and plans of action to ensure that every student at Lake Land College is provided with a continuous learning environment."

Assessment is an important step in developing Lake Land College's programs to best suit its students and their growing skills in order to prepare them to enter the workforce or transfer to a four-year university. It is thanks to a previous DACUM (developing a curriculum) assessment that the Agriculture Division has focused on integrating more precision agriculture information leading from a recommendation from the Lake Land College Agriculture Advisory Council. In addition, the Allied Health Division recently celebrated assessment efforts for the new Medical Assistant Program (MAP). In its first year, Medical Assistant Program students received a 100% pass rate on the first attempt on their certification exam! In addition to passing the certification exam, all MAP students passed 142 skills on their skill check off assessment.
