The Effingham Education Center (Kluthe Center) has offered higher education opportunities to Effingham and surrounding communities since 1995. Thousands of students have taken classes, completed degrees at this facility and utilized the services offered. This year has been full of changes with Karen Kull retiring in February and COVID-19 disrupting life in March. Despite the changes the Effingham Education center has continued to offer the following programs:

# Lake Land College Day at the Kluthe Center:

Each year in March, juniors from Effingham County High Schools are invited to spend a morning or afternoon at the Effingham Education Center. Students attend sessions about how to enroll or pay for college (no matter which college they attend) and what the Effingham Education Center offers, and also receive information on many different college programs and career paths. Our 2020 Kluthe Day even had over 320 students registered but was cancelled due to COVID-19. The next event is scheduled tentatively for March 21, 2021

## Effingham Manufacturing Day:


Effingham Education Center plays a major role in Effingham County Manufacturing Day. The event is hosted by the Effingham Chamber of Commerce and was held on October 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2019. Over 250 students from 15 different schools attended the event. The entire day was geared for students to consider careers in manufacturing as they get to know the companies that are located in Effingham County, what jobs they offer and what they produce. Lake Land College has a big presence at this event to help guide students who are interested in these careers. The students were given a chance to tour different manufacturing facilities in Effingham and then meet with representatives from the college and local employers.

#### Lincoln Event:

#### **Student Services Hours:**

This year we implemented Student Services hours allowing students could have access to an academic counselor, a financial aid advisor, and a Trio representative, in person. We're hopeful this is beneficial to students that may only take courses at Kluthe and don't get the opportunity to speak with someone in these departments on a regular basis. Students were given a piece of candy if they stopped by the table and asked a question about student services.

#### C.E.F.S. Event

Each year we host a tuition assistance event with C.E.F.S. This organization has funding available through WIOA for students in eligible workforce ready programs. This funding is on top of the financial aid they may already receive. We've had a great turnout in years past but unfortunately, this year's event had to be cancelled due to COVID-19. We instead sent an email to all students enrolled in eligible programs and have received great feedback from C.E.F.S. so far regarding student contact. We are happy to connect any student that may be in need of additional financial assistance this fall.



## Rural Development Technology Center

The Effingham Regional Career Academy board and business partners have been busy planning, and hosted several different meetings this past year. Programs and Curriculum met this past March to discuss sequencing and an Agriculture Track. Currently, the intergovernmental agreements between the school districts have been put on hold until legal work can occur. School attorneys are busy dealing with COVID related issues but we're hopeful we can have our next Board of Directors meeting on October 21st to continue planning for the Academy.



#### Karen Kull Retires

Karen Kull has been the director of the Effingham Education Center for 28 years. She was honored with a retirement party at Tuscan Hills this past February. Karen was an integral part of the Effingham County community and participated in several different community organizations including Sunrise Rotary and the Effingham Chamber of Commerce. Karen truly knew everything about the building (and Lake Land in general)! She was constantly finding ways to improve things. From classrooms to course offerings, Karen stopped at nothing to make sure students that took courses at Kluthe had the same opportunities that students up on our main campus do. #### Niemerg replaces Kull


